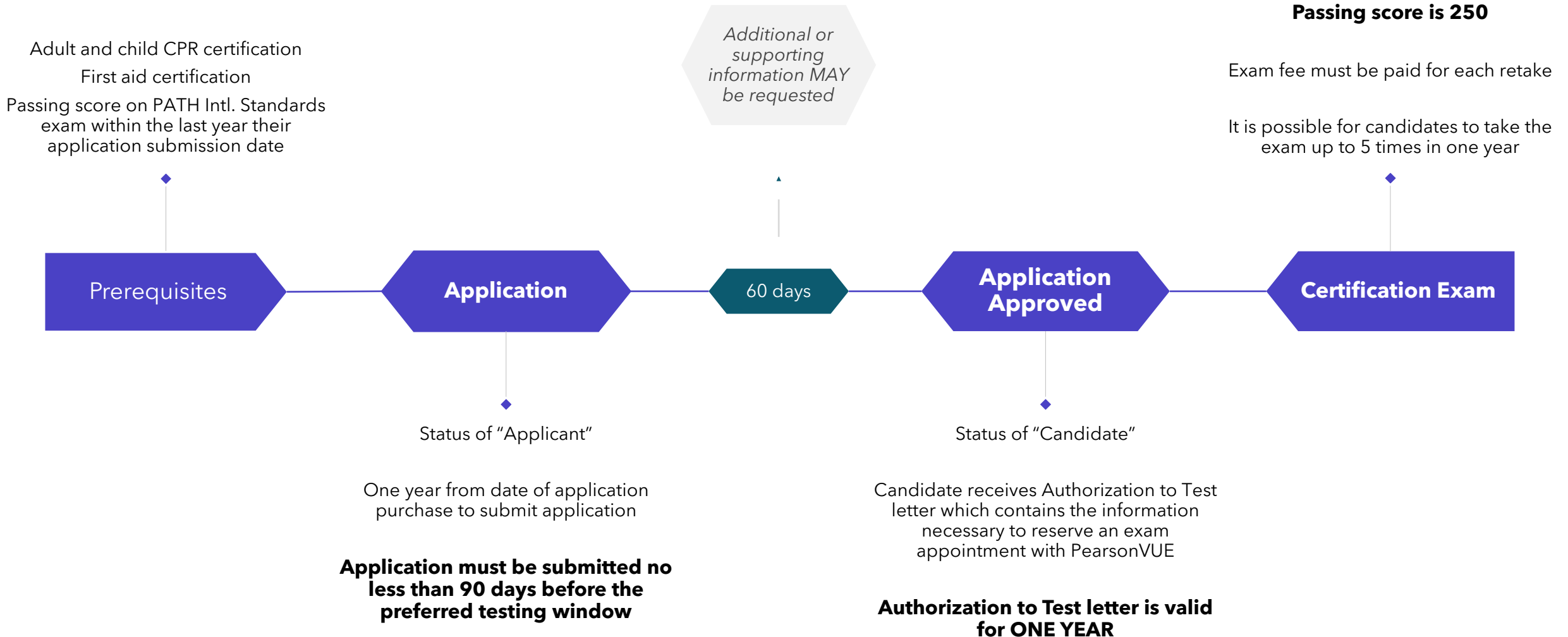

# Introduction

- The PATH Intl. Certified Therapeutic Riding Instructor (CTRI) is a voluntary, entry-level credential for individuals in the equine-assisted services (EAS) profession who provide riding instruction of therapeutic value to people with disabilities. This may include mounted or unmounted work ethically partnering with an equine. PATH Intl.
- CTRIs have met established criteria and standards of practice in the field. They have demonstrated their knowledge of disabilities, equines, teaching and human-animal interactions necessary for effective performance as an entry-level therapeutic riding instructor.



# The Overall Process



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**FIRST, ARE YOU 18 YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER? THEN...**

**NO LESS THAN 90 DAYS PRIOR TO INTENDED DATE OF TESTING:**

- Complete payment for the CTRI application fee
- Purchase and Submit Instructor Application with:
  1. Evidence of Equine Handling Skills
  2. Evidence of Equine Management Skills
  3. Video demonstration of Riding Instruction and Communication of Riding Skills
  4. Documentation of Experience Working with Individuals with Disabilities
  5. Documentation of Supervised Instruction of Therapeutic Riding Lessons
  6. Proof of current Adult & Child CPR and First Aid certifications (Online courses accepted.)
  7. Proof of passing score on PATH Intl. Standards exam (score valid for 1 year)
  8. Signed PATH Intl. Certified Professional Code of Ethics

**UPON VERIFICATION BY PATH INTL. THAT APPLICATION IS APPROVED:**

1. Complete payment for the CTRI certification exam. Allow 48 hours following payment for enrollment in the Pearson VUE exam administration database
2. Receive notification of authorization to test (valid for one year from date application is approved)

*If the application is not approved, the applicant must repurchase a CTRI application and resubmit ALL application components to be reconsidered.*

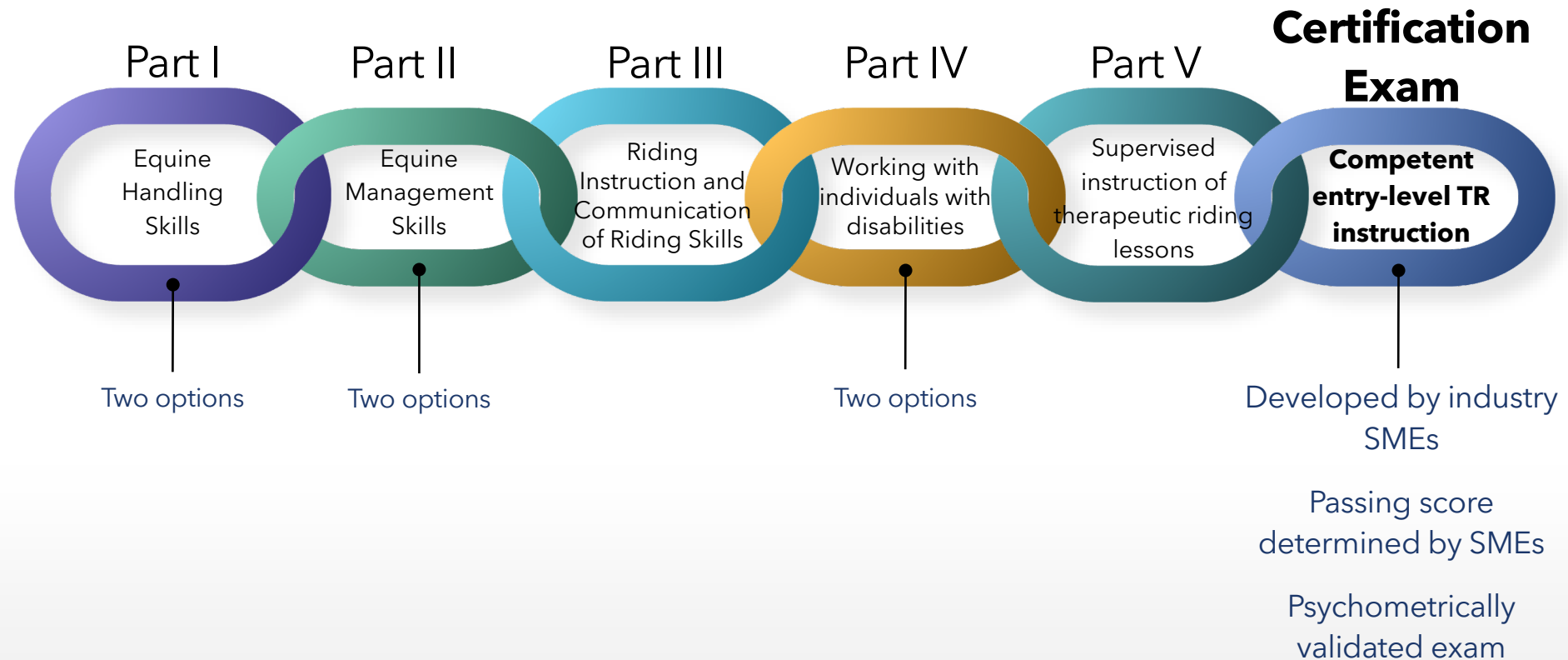
- Complete online examination with a passing score at an authorized Pearson VUE testing center



# Application Requirements

Designed to reflect standards for accreditation by the National Commission of Certifying Agencies (NCCA) to:

- Support factual, **quantitative** reporting of applicant experience
- Assure EAS specific experience while also increasing accessibility to professionals from related fields
- Set specific bar of expectations to insure consistency in competency of certificants and
- Promote portability to other centers/programs to support career sustainability
- Promote impartial assessment of applicant competency
- Prevent conflicts of interest
- Remove as much real or perceived bias as possible from the credentialing process
- **Ensure decisions about applicant competency are objective**

All elements of the certification process work **together** to validate competency

# Video FAQs

- **Quantitative assessment** of correct and clear instruction of the whats, hows and whys of riding skills required to execute the riding pattern
- Rider of applicant's choosing
- Should demonstrate the applicant's personal knowledge, skills and abilities of riding skill instruction
- Assessment focuses on the accuracy and effectiveness of in-the-moment instruction and timeliness of feedback, resulting in improvement of the equine's way of going
- Applicants must instruct, observe the rider's response to their instruction, then verbalize corrections or confirmations to demonstrate awareness of the effectiveness of their instruction
- Applicant's instruction must take place within 20 continuous minutes
- Tack and riding area shown are expected to comply with PATH Intl. standards

# General Parameters for Supervision and Sign-off

- Assure industry specific training to 'grow our own'
- Set specific bar to insure consistency in competency of certificants
- Promote impartial assessment of applicant competency
- Prevent conflicts of interest
- Remove as much real or perceived bias as possible from the credentialing process
- **Ensure decisions about applicant competency are objective**

Adult and child CPR, basic first aid certifications	Training in emergency response
Passing scores on standards exam	Awareness of PATH Intl. standards and how they apply to therapeutic riding best practices
PATH Intl. Certified Professional Code of Ethics	Conduct themselves and business activities in accordance with expectations for PATH Intl. Certified Professionals
Part 1: Equine Handling Skills	Experience handling an equine in an environment with multiple equines present  Knowledge of how to safely handle equines in the presence of other equines and people
Part II: Equine Management Skills	Knowledge of equine health and welfare  Experience safely navigating with and around equines

# Supporting Applicants

Application Component	What applicants should work on
Part III: Video demonstration of Riding Instruction and Communication of Riding Skills	<p>Ability to safely and effectively instruct a rider to perform basic riding skills.</p> <p>Accuracy and effectiveness of in-the-moment instruction and timeliness of feedback, resulting in improvement of the equine's way of going.</p> <p>Instruct and observe the rider's response, then verbalize corrections or confirmations to demonstrate awareness of the effectiveness of the instruction</p>
Part IV: Evidence of working with individuals with disabilities	<p>Experience engaging appropriately with individuals with disabilities to whom the applicant is not related</p> <p>Experience adapting to situations based on the population(s) being served</p>



# Supporting Applicants

Application Component	What applicants should work on
Part V: Evidence of supervised instruction of therapeutic riding lessons	<p>Proper interpretation and application of applicable core, mounted, and ground activity standards</p> <p>Experience managing volunteers and lesson environment</p> <p>Knowledge of how the senses of the equine and equine behavior effect riders and lesson environment</p> <p>Experience reading and to responding to a dynamic environment</p>

# Supporting Candidates

Exam Component	What applicants need to know
Length and format	<p>90 minutes (accommodation for additional time may be granted for disability-related reasons)</p> <p>85 multiple-choice questions: 80 scored, 5 unscored</p> <p>Only the 80 scored questions factor into the candidate's final score</p>
Exam administration	<p>Computer-based unless an accommodation has been granted for pencil and paper administration. ALL exams are proctored regardless of administration type.</p>
Passing score	<p>250 out of 300 possible points</p>
Retakes	<p>Candidates may retake the exam ONCE per testing window while in possession of a valid Authorization to Test letter. This includes the initial testing window.</p> <p>The full certification exam fee must be remitted for the candidate to receive an additional authorization to test and be permitted to register for a retake.</p> <p>A maximum of 5 exam attempts are possible during the one-year validity term of Authorization to Test letters.</p>
